





The Lions Cancer Institute (LCI) will be providing a free Skin Cancer Screening in Wandering, at the Community Centre Carpark, on our Fair Day Saturday 22nd October 2022. This free service provides for the early detection of skin lesions and where a lesion is identified a referral is made to your GP for further investigation. For booking information contact Judy Bullock 0428251151.

The LCI is a project of the Lions Clubs of Western Australia. Since early 1990's LCI has been providing full body skin screening clinics throughout Western Australia, with an emphasis on Screening the remote and rural areas of the state.

From humble beginnings the Volunteers of LCI have screened over 80 000 patients and our records show that with the annual rate of referrals to a GP is in the order of 27% (21,600) and lesions suspected of being life threatening are at 6% (1260). Early detection of lesions will save lives and lessen the need for invasive surgery.

LCI's screening program is supported by qualified volunteer Dermatologists, Plastic Surgeons, Dermoscopists and GP's.



Funding for LCI's screening programs and research grants is provided by donations from Lions Clubs of WA, Business and from the public.

We are currently raising funds to replace our two ageing screening units with one purpose-built unit. Donations can be made to The Lions Cancer Institute at WESTPAC BANK, BSB 036-107 ACCOUNT 218 557.


Wandering Lions

Saturday the 17th of September saw the gathering of the Whitely family to dedicate a table and chairs to the late John Whitely. John was a great contributor to the Lions Club of Wandering holding nearly all administrative positions in the Club and broader positions in the Lion's District. John was also recognised for his other community involvement.

A very authentic shelter over the seats and table was erected in time for the occasion and we thank Ben Pike for his work to have it completed for the event. Iron for the roof of the shelter, very fittingly came from 'Coranning' the family farm in Wandering. Water was flowing generously in the Cheetanning Creek and native flora that had been planted some three years ago is now providing flowers for all to enjoy. Lions have been waiting eagerly to celebrate the 'Walk Trail' and the many hours of its' development. The dedication of the John Whitely table and shelter was an opportunity for us to come together. Community Resource Centre (CRC) Assistant (Part Time)

2022 / 2023 RATES NOTICES

The following letter was sent to all ratepayers regarding the issuing of the 2022/23 Rates Notices. If you did not receive this letter please contact the office to update your email address / postal address.

As you may be aware, the Shire of Wandering has not yet issued the Rates Notices for the 2022/23 year and I thought that it may be appropriate to write to you to explain why you have not received them as yet.

In the 2021/22 year, the Shire finalised converting properties owned in the Rural Residential areas of Blackboy Springs and Wandering Downs from an Unimproved Value (UV) basis for the calculation of rates to Gross Rental Value (GRV) basis for the calculation of rates.

This change requires the Shire to obtain approval from the Minister for Local Government to levy the minimum rate on properties in these two estates due to the high number of properties with very low GRVs.

The Shire recently advertised the differential rating strategy with a 21 day public comment period. Council resolved at a Special Meeting on 4 August 2022 to seek the Ministers approval to levy the minimum rate for more than 50% of properties that are classified as vacant land.

The Department of Local Government has advised that due to a minor change in the differential rating strategy, the advertising period has to re-start and the Council has to re-publish the Statement of Objects and Reasons for the 2022/23 year. The advertising period will be a further 21 days. After this 21 day period, the Council will then seek the ministers approval again to levy the minimum rate for more than 50% of properties that are classified as vacant land.

This will mean that the 2022/23 rates notices will not be issued until October 2022.

Please note you are able to make a payment on your rates at any time of year, please use your rates notice assessment number as a reference. If you wish to pay off your rates in weekly, fortnightly or monthly instalments an arrangement can be put in place. Please contact the Shire on 9884 1056 or reception@wandering.wa.gov.au.

If you would like to pay your rates now, simply pay the same amount that you did last year (we can assist you with finding out this information), and when the rates notices are issued the amount can be adjusted and you will receive a refund, or notice of amount due. Any extra amount can also be credited to your account for the following year if you choose.

Going away? Please let us know and we can put a hold on your account until you get back.

Council Corner

WORKS UPDATE

- Winter maintenance grading of gravel roads has been completed on our road network.
- Road construction work on the York Williams Road between Kelly Road and Carrabin Road has commenced and will be
 completed before Christmas 2022. This work will include vegetation clearing along the road shoulder, formation of
 table drains, placement of gravel and bitumen sealing.
- Road side vegetation works has been completed on Grahams Road and if time allows work will commence on Codjatotine Hastings Road prior to construction work on the York Williams Road.
- Construction of the new access ramp between the Wandering Community Centre and the Oval is ongoing and is planned to be finished by 21 October prior to the Wandering Fair.
- Roadside spraying on the North Bannister-Wandering Road to Pumphrey's Bridge has recently been completed.
- The installation of four water tanks for fire fighting purposes is completed. This project is fully funded by the state government as part of DFES support for additional water resources in rural areas during bushfires.
- Wandering Fire Station upgrade the Shire has applied for additional funding for the project due to increased costs and is currently waiting for DFES approval. The Shire is hoping to have this project completed before June 2023. The plans can be viewed on our website.



Festival to Celebrate our Wonderful Wetlands

Nature enthusiasts of all ages are invited to get involved with the Wetlands Weekender Mini Festival these school holidays in Mandurah on Saturday 8 and Sunday 9 October. Celebrating the waterways that are the lifeblood of our region, the Peel-Harvey Catchment Council's annual festival program is packed with fantastic family-friendly activities.

Sunday's festival is the highlight of the weekend but the fun begins with Saturday's program kicking off not one but two Nature Photography Workshops with Sharon Meredith Photography where participants will venture into the great outdoors to discover photography basics, along with tips and tricks for snapping wetland landscapes. The morning workshop is targeted towards budding photographers and the afternoon workshop is designed especially for kids aged 4 to 13 years old..

Saturday's main event is a Peel-Harvey Estuary boat tour aboard the Dancing Dolphin with expert tour guides Jeremy Ringma and Steve Fisher sharing their stories about the abundant wildlife and wetland environment. Participants will experience this internationally significant wetland from the water before docking at Len Howard Conservation Park to explore the park on foot with local Noongar Representative George Walley and local Zoologist Sarah Way. The twilight boat trip home includes a smorgasbord of local produce and refreshments.

Sunday 9 October is 'World Migratory Bird Day' and the festival continues with a free family-friendly event – the Wonders of Our Wetlands! Coodanup Foreshore will come alive from 8.30am with live music, vibrant market stalls, and various food and coffee vans. Come and join in with a range of exciting interactive activities for all ages offered by Coastal Waste Warriors, Mandurah Environment and Heritage Group, Estuary Guardians, BirdLife WA, Ways to Nature, Sharon Meredith Photography and others at their foreshore stalls.

As part of the Wonders of Our Wetlands event on Coodanup Foreshore participants can bring their dogs to meet with City of Mandurah rangers and BirdLife WA for the Dog's Breakfast between 8.30am to 10.30am. Bring your furry friend along and receive a free bacon and egg roll! For those who would like to get hands on in looking after the wetlands, join the Pave the Way clean up with Coastal Waste Warriors, starting at 9am and concluding at 11am.

PHCC's Chairperson Caroline Knight says "The Wetlands Weekender festival brings the community together to celebrate and learn more about our Peel-Yalgorup Wetlands, recognised as internationally significant through the Ramsar Convention for the habitat they provide for migratory birds and for a diversity of other species such as fish, crabs, dolphins and threatened communities like the thrombolites at Lake Clifton. We invite anyone who is interested in the natural environment to join us for the festival to explore our waterways and especially to welcome back migratory birds to our shores after their breeding season in the northern hemisphere".

BREAST CANCER



Common symptoms:



Lumps and bumps

A lump or hard area in your breast or underarm, especially if it is only on one side.



Unusual dimpling or rashes

Change in the look of your breast, like: your skin looks like the skin of an orange, your skin looks and feels different in one area, redness or rash.



Changes to the nipple

Changes to the nipple, like: it's pulled inwards, leaking, itchy or has a sore that won't heal.



Pain or swelling

Breast pain or discomfort, especially if it is only on one side.



A change in size

A change in the size, shape or feel of your breast.

Get to know your breasts and what is normal for you. If you notice any of these symptoms or unusual changes, talk to a doctor, clinic nurse or Aboriginal health worker without delay.

If you have a symptom, it does not mean you have breast cancer. Often these symptoms turn out to be something less serious. However, it is important to get these symptoms or any unusual changes in your body checked out just in case.

Mental Health and Wellbeing – You Can't Have One Without the Other

Google the word mental health and you'll find numerous organisations and groups promoting the importance of mental health, but how it is described and the context in which it is discussed can vary significantly. We think understanding the difference between mental health and wellbeing and mental illness is important as this is one area where definitions can become blurred and language may disempower people by putting them in a box.

Mental health and wellbeing encompasses all aspects of our emotional, psychological and social wellbeing, so it affects how we feel, think and interact with the world around us. A good definition which encapsulates this is summarised by the World Health Organisation (2007) – a state of wellbeing in which an individual realises his or her own abilities, can cope with normal stresses of life, can work productively and is able to make a contribution to his or her community. In summary we think that having good mental health is the ability to deal with life's challenges and changes, maintaining positive relationships, enjoying life and getting the balance right.

Mental illness on the other hand is a health problem that affects how we think, behave and interact therefore significantly affecting our mental health and wellbeing. It is diagnosed according to standardised criteria. Some of the major types of mental illnesses are anxiety, schizophrenia, bipolar, personality disorders, and depression. However, what if I was in a period in my life where things were not so great, I'm not coping, and the challenges and changes are starting to become overwhelming? Does this mean I have a mental illness? I think not.

I say this because sometimes it seems in society, we are almost not allowed to feel pain, show weakness, or not cope as this may be interpreted as there being something wrong with us. Unfortunately, the system provides the word depression as an answer for a whole range of situational stressors which occur in society and need to be discussed. We need to normalise a person's response during a difficult or abnormal life event and a phrase we coin for times like this is being in a state of Situational Distress.

There are numerous life challenges that come our way that can cause us distress such as separation, illness, injury, trauma, financial worries, grief, adolescence, fatherhood, midlife, change of job, redundancy and transition into retirement. When it comes to our mental health and wellbeing it's important to remember none of

us are exempt from hard knocks! Just as we're given the vulnerability to experience tragedy, we're given the human resources to heal and deal with it. As T. Green (2008) states "We don't get memory erasures, but we're given stamina, resilience and fortitude to see the world hasn't stopped."



What can we do to assist and manage situational distress and get our mental health and wellbeing back into balance?

- Identify our mates (build a support network of people we feel safe to confide in i.e. peer, partner, mentor);
- Program time out from work and normalize the problem;
- Maintain social opportunities, take time to laugh with others;
- Take a break, a holiday, go fishing, try something different, explore our passions and interest;
- Exercise, keep active and maintain a healthy diet (this includes reducing alcohol use);
- Make sure we are getting enough sleep;
- Be willing to talk to the appropriate people i.e. family, mates, work colleagues or a professional (accountant, lawyer, psychologist, helpline or GP).

Maintaining a balance and aiming for positive mental health and wellbeing is something we all need to do, this includes acknowledging that we are all susceptible to the stressors of life. Our health and wellbeing are our responsibility, be proactive, address our distress early and don't let it get out of hand.

Shining a light on solar complaints

As one of the world's sunniest landscapes, Western Australia is home to a booming rooftop solar industry that shows little sign of slowing down as many households look to address rising power bills and reduce pollution.

More than 400,000 WA homes and businesses, or around 36 per cent of customers, are estimated to have rooftop solar connected to WA's main grid, with that figure predicted to swell to 50 per cent by 2030.

Although there's a lot to love about this particular renewable, 189 consumers have complained to Consumer Protection in the past two years about issues such as poor quality parts, companies not responding or providing false and misleading information, and installers failing to use due care and skill.

During a recent radio segment we heard from one consumer whose \$12,500 rooftop solar system had stopped working not long after the installer went out of business. As we make enquiries to see whether the manufacturer can honour the warranty, it's a timely reminder for consumers to thoroughly research who they plan to do business with.

Before agreeing to buy a solar PV system, get several quotes for the total cost, search online for independent reviews and make sure your preferred supplier is accredited by searching the <u>Clean Energy Council</u> (CEC) website.

If a supplier's verbal claims are influencing your decision, make sure to have them included in the written contract and read through all the terms and conditions.

Remember that solar installers are not allowed to use forceful or high pressured sales tactics to get you to buy something, nor can they provide you with false or misleading information. They must also ensure their products and services meet the consumer guarantees.

The system's electrical components must be installed by a licensed electrician working under a licensed electrical contractor. Ask to see these licences and expect to receive an electrical safety certificate for the work. Our colleagues at Building and Energy can assist if you have any electrical compliance concerns.

When bait advertising bites

It may be a familiar scenario for some shoppers – you spot an advert for a product at a very attractive sale price and place an order, but it's later cancelled by the retailer claiming the item is 'out-of-stock.'

Consumers may be left wondering whether the business is obliged to honour the discounted price, regardless of whether the item had genuinely sold-out or if a mistake had been made during the advertising process.

The answer depends on a number of factors. Bait advertising – where sale prices and special offers are promoted to attract customers – is a legitimate form of advertising, but only if the trader provides sufficient quantities of the product to meet the anticipated demand. The only exception to this rule is if it's made very clear in the advert that the discounted goods are available for "today only" or "while stocks last" for example.

Let's say a retailer advertises a week-long sale on a product and it would usually expect to sell thirty of those items in a week, but stocks just two items at the advertised price that sell-out in one or two days. This is likely to be illegal bait advertising and a breach of Australian Consumer Law (ACL) because the retailer does not have a reasonable supply of the advertised product.

In a situation like this, a consumer may be entitled to receive a remedy, such as a 'rain check' (a coupon guaranteeing an out-of-stock sale item may be purchased at a later date at the same reduced price) or an acceptable substitute product at the same discounted price. Alternatively, to avoid breaching the ACL, a retailer can publish a retraction to a similar audience or circulation number as the original advert.

Remember that it makes no difference whether a business intends to mislead customers or not. If the overall impression of any advertisement, promotion, quotation or representation leaves a misleading impression in customers' minds – regarding price, value or quality – then the behaviour is likely to breach the law.

The recent Optus data breach has reminded us of the need to stay alert to scams and scammers.

A day doesn't go by when I don't look at a few emails and wonder if they are legitimate. A suspicious looking email address is the first clue. An unfamiliar contact is further proof that the email is not safe to open.

We know of the scams that promise millions if we just provide our bank details. This is another clue of its obvious motive to lure someone in and take their money.

Recently I have been reminded of the need to be vigilant by constituents who have rung me with their experiences.

I have had farmers who have big enterprises, businesses, sporting clubs and other agencies who deal with large figures approach me about receiving correspondence in what are appearing to be increasingly sophisticated scamming operations.

Scammers are infiltrating email accounts and changing invoices before resending and using the same template with slightly different contact information, to make sure everything looks legitimate.

We have heard this before, but the scammers are changing their methodology and developing new strategies to con us.

Sums of up to \$250,000 per transaction have been scammed out of these businesses. It is serious money and the chance of getting that back is very low.

In the past, there was management liability insurance, but the growing nature of the problem has seen the conditions change to be almost impossible to insure against.

I want to alert everyone to the possibility of being targeted and losing precious income. If the invoice says that the bank details have changed, don't accept it – ever.

Ring the company directly, with a contact number sourced from their website or somewhere other than the invoice, and speak to someone in accounts and check the bank details. Get confirmation in writing, even from a separate email account.

If you find an anomaly, let the business know and then report it to Consumer Protection or ScamNet on 1300 30 40 54 or use their website to report the scam online. You can also stay up to date on new scams by subscribing to WA ScamNet alerts.

We work incredibly hard for our income. It is up to us to protect our hard-earned money. Don't be afraid to report it, don't be embarrassed that it has happened to you. Be informed and be alert.




