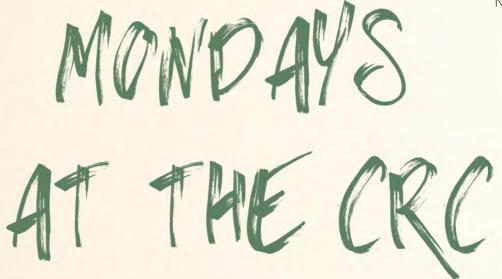

Wandering Lions Club



The big weekend!

Congratulations to those who organised the events of the Campout weekend as there was once again a great opportunity to showcase our locality and community.

Lions were once again proud to be involved in the workings of the Campout and Fair weekend.

One of the attractions at the Fair ground was the presence and patronage of the Lions Cancer Screening Bus. The screening tasks, record keeping and driving, of the bus are carried out entirely by volunteers and strongly supported by Lions in general. Wandering Lions are keen financial contributors to the screening bus overheads.

An exercise such as this produces interesting statistics which Lions are able to share. There where 42 local clients booked into 70 available time slots. By the end of the screening period all available time slots were filled by walk in patrons and an additional 26 were accommodated meaning 96 people were able to partake.

There were 62 females and 34 males. There were 5 people referred. 15 lesions were discovered, 2 being threatening. It is carefully noted that all lesions are only suspect until proven otherwise by further investigation.

55 clients had not been checked for over 12 months and 27 had never been checked. From Wandering the screening bus had another fully booked next day at Boddington. For those who took advantage of the screening, well done. And a great thank you to the volunteer specialist doctors.

WORKS UPDATE

- Winter maintenance grading of gravel roads has finished and summer grading will be ongoing over the next few months.
- Road construction work on the York Williams Road between Kelly Road and Carrabin Road will commence and be
 completed before Christmas 2022. This work will include vegetation clearing along the road shoulder, formation of
 table drains, placement of gravel and bitumen sealing.
- Road side vegetation works has finished on Grahams Road due to the summer months and potential fire danger mulching has finished until next winter.
- Construction of the new access ramp between the Wandering Community Centre and the Oval has been installed and was finished by 21 October prior to the Wandering Fair with a lot of people using it on fair day. The Shire is awaiting railing and tactiles to complete the job. See photo below.
- Inspection of the Wandering Bowling Green is showing no signs of damage since the subsoil drainage was installed.
- The installation of four water tanks for fire fighting purposes has been completed with fencing installed on all four tanks and fitting to mains water installed on the Moramockining tank. Signs for fire fighting purposes are to be installed.
- Wandering Fire Station upgrade the Shire has applied for additional funding for the project due to increased costs
 and has been approved by DFES. The Shire is hoping to have this project completed before June 2023. The plans can
 be viewed on our website.
- The Shire has connected the Caravan Park dump point to the Caravan Park leech drain system so as to reduce pump out costs due to the increase use of this free liquid waste disposal for caravan and camper van owners.

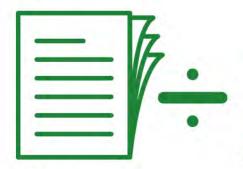

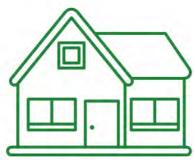

 - Hire of plastic/steel frame chairs from the Wandering Community Centre at a rate of \$1.10 per chair for a hire period of three (3) days.

Weed ID Workshop

What a fantastic event!

Local Landowners from the Hotham- Williams Catchment recently enjoyed a very informative and valuable information session on identifying local weeds, with the help of plant experts Bronwen & Greg Keighery.

There were 20 participants with over 30 weed samples that were identified and discussed.

All participants received a copy of "Southern Weeds and their control".

Just two of the species identified on the day were:

Watsonia

Tufted herb that propagates from underground corms. Grazing provides effective control, as does cultivation to 100mm, if done after the old corm is exhausted and before the new corms form or the flower stem emerges.



Spear thistle

Herbaceous biennial with narrowly winged spiny stems. Mowing is only effective if done closely and multiple times throughout the year to prevent seed production. Manual removal is effective for small areas but make sure you wear gloves!

Woodlands for Wildlife

Recently we held a Woodlands for Wildlife Workshop in Dryandra Woodland National Park where Simon Cherriman presented to 29 interested local landholders and community members. Simon spoke about tree hollows, habitat loss and how nest-boxes can help wildlife in south-west Australia. We then had a guided nature walk through the woodland to learn how to identify tree hollows and look for animal traces, some of the old wandoo trees that we saw were like hotels for multiple bird species. We finished up the afternoon with a nest box building and installation demonstration from Simon, using re-used and recycled materials.

We were able to give away a copy of Simon's book 'Hollowed Out?, a medium mammal nest box and a numbat pin as door prices which were all well received. November is Lung Cancer Awareness Month

Did you know?

- Lung cancer is the third most common cancer affecting both women and men in Western Australia.
- In 2017, 637 Western Australian men and 472 Western Australian women were diagnosed with lung cancer.

Common symptoms of lung cancer include:

• Coughing or spitting up blood (once or more)

Or, for more than four weeks:

- A new cough or change to your usual cough
- Repeated chest infections
- Becoming more short of breath, tired or lacking energy
- Losing weight without trying
- Pain in your chest or shoulder
- Finding it hard to breathe or swallow
- Not feeling hungry.

If you have coughed up blood, even if it was just once, it's important to tell your doctor, clinic nurse or Aboriginal health worker straight away.

If you have had any of the other symptoms for more than four weeks, tell your doctor, clinic nurse or health worker. It doesn't mean you've got lung cancer – often these symptoms turn out to be something less serious. But it's important to tell your health professional and get checked out to be safe.

If it is lung cancer, the earlier it's found, the earlier it can be treated.

Sid's message – 'Slip Slop Slap Seek and Slide' It's National Skin Cancer Action Week 21st – 27th November and with two in three Australians diagnosed with skin cancer by age 70, the action week is an important reminder to use sun protection and of the importance of early skin cancer detection for all Australians as we make our way into summer. It's important to use the five forms of sun protection:

Slip on sun-protective clothing,

Slop on SPF30 (or higher) broad-spectrum, water-resistant sunscreen,

Slap on a broad-brimmed hat,

Seek shade,

Slide on sunglasses.

A combination of these measures, along with getting to know your skin and regularly checking for any changes are the keys to reducing your skin cancer risk. Find out more about being SunSmart at SunSmart - Cancer Council WA (cancerwa.asn.au)

Renters experiencing financial difficulty

As living costs rise, many tenants may find themselves in a difficult financial position and struggle to pay rent.

We urge tenants who miss (or expect to miss) a rental payment to explain their situation to their landlord or real estate agent as soon as possible to hopefully avoid stressful breach notices, potential court action and even eviction.

A landlord might agree to a rent reduction for a period of time, waive a payment or agree to defer payment over a longer timeframe while you get back on your feet.

Your landlord's willingness to help may depend on their own financial position and whether you've been a responsible tenant, however it could be in their interest to negotiate a solution.

In shared tenancies, the landlord might let you assign the agreement to a replacement cotenant, or allow you to sub-let the property to another tenant to help share the cost.

It is wise to avoid pay-day loans or buy now pay later schemes to pay your rent. They might look like an easy way out, but can make a difficult financial situation worse.

If you have a periodic tenancy, you can provide 21 days' written notice to terminate the agreement. Remember that it is usually easier to move from one rental into another, rather than try to find a new tenancy once court action or an eviction process has commenced.

Should you fail to pay rent, a landlord can either issue a breach notice requiring you to pay the outstanding amount in 14 days, or a termination notice giving you seven days to vacate. A landlord cannot force you out of a property by changing the locks or tampering with the water and power supply.

If you don't pay all rent owing by the due date and don't move out, the landlord must apply to the Magistrates Court for an order to vacate. A tenant can ask the magistrate to delay the termination for 30 days if they're likely to suffer hardship (such as being unable to find other accommodation).

Keeping up with the cost of living

Times are tough for many Western Australians right now, so lots of households will be looking at ways to manage their rising living costs and keep on top of bills.

To help consumers manage their living expenses, the Australian Securities and Investment Commission's (ASIC) Moneysmart service has developed a cost of living 'hub' on its website.

The hub contains information to help consumers make a plan, including how to prepare a budget to track where money is spent, prioritise what matters most and identify any expenses that can be reduced.

With interest rates on the rise, some consumers may be concerned about meeting their mortgage repayments. Taking action straight away can stop a small problem from becoming a big one, so these consumers are urged to talk to their lender as soon as possible. The hub talks through the steps to apply for a financial hardship variation, which may involve changing the loan's terms, or temporarily pausing or reducing repayments.

Financial hardship assistance may also be available for those struggling to pay their rent, utility bills, credit cards, loans and insurance premiums, so these consumers are also advised to contact their providers sooner rather than later to discuss possible options.

Further advice is provided on how consumers can save for an emergency fund to cover urgent or unexpected costs for things like car repairs, unexpected travel or an urgent medical bill.

For those living on a low income, the hub provides guidance on what financial support is available, as well as exploring practical ways to manage costs, such as automating regular bill payments and paying large bills in smaller instalments.

Consumers needing help to get debt under control and their finances back on track can talk to a financial counsellor, who can help prioritise bills and repayments. The National Debt Helpline provides a free, confidential financial counselling service on 1800 007 007.

There is also advice on where to turn in a crisis for help with food, housing, bills and emergency support, plus a reminder that help is available via Beyond Blue on 1300 22 46 36 if financial stress is impacting on mental health.

Cardiovascular Awareness - How's Your Pump and Pipes?

It's no surprise that when we combine disease associated with the *heart* (pump) and *blood vessels* (pipes) it's our biggest killer, largest health problem, and places a great burden on our economy and health system. This of course is without even considering the issues around grief, loss of function and care requirements that can also impact individuals and families.

Cardiovascular Disease (CVD) is a major cause of death in our country. It kills one Aussie every 12 minutes and is responsible for causing one in four (26%) of all deaths. Someone is hospitalised for CVD every minute and those living in regional and remote areas, generally have higher rates of death from CVD than other Australians (Heart Foundation Aust).

Why Pump and Pipes? If we think about a pump moving water through a series of pipes, over time sediment can slowly build up and slow the flow of water or even cause a blockage. Most blokes would understand this would result in the pump having to work harder which can cause it to eventually fail or blow a hose.



This is no different to coronary heart disease which occurs through the build-up of fatty deposits (plaque) in the arteries that feed the heart. Narrowing reduces the supply of blood and oxygen to our heart and if this becomes too narrow it can cause angina (pain/discomfort in chest) or if a blood clot causes a complete block, then this can cause a heart attack. This is similar to when a clot occurs in blood vessels to the brain causing a stroke.

Warning signs for a heart attack may include a single or a combination of symptoms such as pain, heaviness or tightness in one or more areas of the upper body, shortness of breath, dizziness or a cold sweat.

If you think someone's having a stroke the Stroke Foundation has come up with an easy to remember checklist referred to as **FAST**:

- Face Has their mouth dropped?
- Arm Can they lift both arms?
- Speech Is it slurred, can they understand you?
- Time Is critical, call 000 immediately.

Factors that contribute to CVD include family history (which we can't change) but some of the other risks we can manage by making healthy lifestyle choices are:

- · don't smoke;
- · maintain a healthy diet;
- · do regular exercise;
- · reduce our alcohol intake (take a couple of days off a week):
- · monitor our body weight;
- · moderate our salt, sugar & fat intake; and
- · look after our mental health & wellbeing.

It's important we acknowledge that a lot of CVD is preventable, however it's essential that we understand our individual risk factors that may impact on us developing diseases associated with our heart and blood vessels. The onset of other health issues such as diabetes, obesity, even erectile dysfunction can be an indicator that our pump and pipes could be under pressure.

So, just remember like any good piece of machinery, there are some basic *Operating Tips* to keep things running at optimal performance!
