



Think positively and enjoy the Christmas period. Ian Turton, Shire President.








Helping to Solve WA's Housing Crisis

A lot has been said about the housing shortage in WA. Not just in Perth or regional centres but throughout WA.

Businesses would like to employ more staff, but they can't find housing. A recent survey found one in five houses is the southern Wheatbelt is unoccupied. A lot of these vacant houses are on farms or rural properties.



Many are vacant for a reason. They are well on their way to rack and ruin. They are not needed for the farm, or they are too far out for anyone else.

But what about the rest? Still liveable with a modest investment. Not too far out, with access to power and water.

Farmers generally are not in the real estate business, but if you could rent it out to a good tenant with guarantees from the Shire or a local employer or both, and there is someone else to co-invest in any works needed, would you consider it?

The Shire of Wandering is investigating the possibility of a housing pilot using existing rural housing stock.

It is a lot quicker to refresh existing housing stock than to build new houses.

Do you have one and what would it take for you to make it available?

We need your input, your ideas, your suggestions - and your houses.

Works Update November 2023

MAINTENANCE GRADING

With the network now drying out, the grader has only been patch grader and doing single cuts, The focus now is drains/offshoots and backslopes

YORK WILLAMS RE-CONSTRUCTION

The crew are currently replacing old culverts and extending culverts were needed, we have also added an additional culvert into this section, once this is completed, the focus will be road widening and clearing before gravel overlay, in preparation for wet mixing, which is scheduled for around 9th of January, followed by the seal Work, which is scheduled for 22nd January 2024



MAINTENANCE GENERAL:

The septics at the public toilets have let us down again, it was decided the only solution was to replace the two old leach drains, which is now completed.

UP COMING WORKS:



Targeted weeding to support native seedlings

PHCC staff, Kristy and Victoria were joined by Newmont volunteers, Jordan and Paul at Williams River which is one of eight River Action Plan (RAP) sites in the Hotham-Williams sub catchment.

The day's task was to locate and remove rye grass and other invasive species the manual way! This site has already undergone revegetation efforts in addition to carefully targeted weed spraying throughout the year. A select few areas of riparian vegetation had been left untouched from herbicide application to protect the native couch (*Sporobolus virginicus*) growing naturally, and the native seedlings planted in July. Capturing the precise moment before the rye grass had set seed, we manually removed it from these areas to minimise future spread. Sometimes a little extra effort (from the care taken by our weed control contractor and our weed-pulling volunteers) can go a long way in allowing native species to prosper and grow.

To water or not?

There are advocates of not watering at all when it comes to revegetation with native species. A proportion of seedlings will always be lost during the first summer (some sites more than others) and those can be replaced on an annual basis to gradually revegetate an area. Others might choose to water seedlings only a few times over the first summer when temperatures are forecast to push 40 degrees for several days.

We chose to water some of the seedlings at the Williams RAP site during the weeding effort for a number of reasons including the current heat wave, highly compacted (and structure-less) saline soil conditions, easy access to the river water nearby, and people power to cart buckets!

This project is funded through partnerships with South32 Worsley Alumina, Newmont and Shire of Williams.

- Being bitten by a snake
- Getting lost
- Visiting your neighbours property



Happy cats

Pet cats that are contained are significantly less likely to become injured and require vet treatment. It is also a cats natural instinct to hunt so by containing your cat you will also be protecting WA's unique native fauna.

The Importance of Fathers

Our team at Regional Men's Health talk to a lot of blokes, the other important side to this is we also do a lot of listening. Comments that often come up, especially from men of the older generation is I wish I had spent more time with my kids, or I spent my life busting my guts working and missed out on a lot of the little things.

Life can sometimes be a double-edged sword and I personally have the utmost respect for men who saw their primary role as the breadwinner and gave precedence to their work, with the best interest of their family in mind. The downside to this, of course, was that these men were quite often too busy with work, or away from the family, to be able to commit time at home to do some of the little things that are now considered commonplace.

My partner did an amazing job giving birth to all three of our children at home (under the supervision of an experienced midwife) and I was actively encouraged to be involved through all stages of the pregnancy and birthing process. My experience, of course, is vastly different to that of men from my grandfather's era, who were told by the midwife well you have done your job, we'll let you know when we need you!



In modern society the family structure varies and there are no set rules on who does what. Women have historically been considered the carers and nurturers, but they may also have careers. The question I have is are we as open and accepting of men who show a nurturing and caring side as well as a commitment to his working and professional career? Is this balance possible?

Spending time with the kids is a priority for many blokes and I believe some of the most enjoyable and rewarding times come from being in their company. Don't get me wrong, we will all have times when we're challenged, tested (usually our patience) and sometimes even question our ability as a father, this is normal. In addition to this we need to be aware of and manage our work, spend time with our partner and make time to explore our own passions and interests (self-care).

A few tips for father and father/mentor figures out there:

- Don't be afraid of the everyday tasks when our child is born; changing nappies, bathing, feeding, they're all important bonding opportunities;
- As our kids grow get to know them and take an interest in their passions, interests, hopes, dreams and schooling;
- Talk to our kids, ask them how their day was, tell them about our day;
- Reading is one of the simplest beneficial things we can do with them;
- There is a saying if we spent twice as much time and half the amount of money on our children we and they would be better off. Keep it simple, time and presence are the most precious gift.

To those men out there who may carry feelings of regret, guilt or loss about what they missed out on with their children, don't forget that any guy can be a Dad, but it takes someone special to be a Father. Even if our children are now adults don't forget every child, no matter what their age, seeks the approval of their father. Tell our kids today that we're proud of them and we love them.

Your rights on cancelled flights

Ask any traveller about their top travel peeves and cancelled or delayed flights are likely to feature highly on the list, given their potential to throw holiday plans and itineraries into turmoil.

Flight cancellations and delays are among the most complained about issues to Consumer Protection – in the 2022/23 financial year, we received 530 complaints about flights being cancelled and 47 complaints about them being delayed.

When your own travel plans are disrupted, it's always best to contact the airline or your travel agent in the first instance to request a resolution. If that fails, consumers may come to us for help with negotiating a fair outcome under Australian Consumer Law through our conciliation service.

In one recent case, our conciliation service was able to successfully organise a \$21,222 refund for a family who had little option but to buy business class tickets to return home to Perth after their initial flights were cancelled by the airline. Another recent success story involved a \$2,000 refund from an airline that had stopped responding to the consumer's communications after cancelling their flights.

When it comes to your own travel disruptions, your right to a remedy will depend on which party made the cancellation and why.

If the airline cancels, they may offer a refund or another remedy, such as rescheduling your flights without penalty, or – if none are available in a reasonable time – reimbursing you the cost of booking replacement flights with another airline.

Passengers may not be entitled to a refund if they miss their flight or change their mind and an airline's obligations may not apply if reasons are outside their control, like bad weather.

Cancelled flights have been in the spotlight recently, after the Australian Competition and Consumer Commission (ACCC) launched legal action alleging Qantas Airways had engaged in false, misleading or deceptive conduct by advertising tickets for more than 8,000 flights it had already cancelled but not removed from sale.

The ACCC's Federal Court case concerns Qantas flights sold between 1 May 2022 and 31 July 2022 and the national consumer affairs regulator is hoping affected consumers will share their experience via an <u>online survey</u> at https://consultation.accc.gov.au.

Water supply in a bushfire

This information could save your life

While leaving high-risk bushfires is the safest option, if you plan to stay and defend your home, you must have an INDEPENDENT water supply and pumping capability. This typically requires water tanks of at least 20,000 litres, pump and generator.

This is required as mains water supply and pressure cannot be guaranteed during a bushfire due to the risk of power cuts, fire damage and extreme demand.

Use the Department of Fire and Emergency Services resources to develop your personal bushfire survival plan: mybushfireplan. wa.gov.au. You can also download the My Bushfire Plan app via the App Store or Google Play to access your bushfire plan anytime - even without an internet connection.

To support bushfire plans, if you have groundwater bore access to surface water, you can take and store emergency water without it counting against your annual entitlement. For more information on this, and for the location of emergency bushfire water supplies in dryland agricultural areas, visit the Department of Water and

Environmental Regulation website: water.wa.gov.au/fireplanning.

Drinking water

We recommend you keep a supply of drinking water on hand throughout summer in case your water supply is interrupted.




