Lions and members of the shire council and their partners teamed up to prepare and serve an Aussie breakfast to over one hundred patrons who attended Australia Day celebrations.

Given the day being a Friday attached to a weekend the numbers of breakfasters was very encouraging and a great atmosphere was enjoyed by all. It is definitely great way to celebrate being Australian, living as we can and to propel our community into the coming year. There was some weighted anticipation as to how the new verandah at the Community Centre would enhance the occasion. The general consensus was that given the perfect day the new structure is a great asset.

Lions are very pleased to be strongly involved in this event with our members being available to cook and serve breakfast, welcome those who had come to celebrate and generally make the day a success. Well done Alana and crew as much planning goes into such an event.

Lions continue to raise significant funds through the containers for change programme and these monies are directed to cancer research along with other Lion's institutes of research and support. The battery drive was also successful and a thank you goes out to the supporters of that effort. Both of these fund raisers are on going and Lions are always thankful for the support.









My dad and his family purchased Fernhill on Australia Day 1970 and mum, dad and myself then shifted to the farm from Cannington in April/May of that year with my siblings Paul, Alison and Tim making Wandering their home as they left Bentley Hospital.

I went to Boddington District High School for my primary schooling. The ABC 7.45 am music was the cue to be out the door on the pushbike to ride to the front gate to catch the school bus, while waiting for the bus there were many waves from passing cars and trucks and we would always ask mum and dad who was driving WD.... As they waved to us, the old-fashioned community hello. I remember getting off the bus one afternoon and mum was waiting to pick me up which I couldn't understand why, she then told me that someone had borrowed my bike without authorisation but dad, Uncle Malcolm and our neighbours Mr Watts (Max), Mr Ferguson (Danny) and Mr Stewart (Peter) were out looking for it. Mr Ferguson found it a couple of days later parked up behind some rocks at Lazy B. There are many fond memories of travelling on the school bus each day – throwing Mr Ziwoski's paper out the bus window, eating the centre out of Mrs Ferguson's loaf of bread (poor Bayden), the school bus was the community delivery service. There were also a few antics at trying to remove grumpy bus drivers that would not be allowed today.

The annual CWA Christmas Tree was held in old hall which is now the CRC. I remember the trestle tables down the centre of the hall with larges plates and platters of food being provided by our mothers and grandmothers, there were lots of kids running everywhere and the metal playground equipment that was between the shire offices and CRC was the central attraction until Santa rocked up. Our fathers and grandfathers stood outside boasting who had the best harvest yields somethings never change.

I completed my high school years at boarding school in Perth coming home for long weekends and school holidays. Communication home to mum and dad was via a letter each week. During the holidays I was able to visit Mr Charlton (Barkie) at the post office and go through his book of postage stamps to purchase a few for my stamp collection (gone are those days). During high school I started playing tennis at the Wandering Tennis courts which were located within this community centre footprint. The tennis courts had been unused for several years and needed refurbishment and the community reestablished the club by revamping the tennis courts and building a shelter. Community members came together to prepare the shearing shed at Fernhill for a Barn dance. The shearing board was polished within an inch of its life for The Keith Stewart Band to play music for the adults to dance to the Waltz, Pride of Erin, Foxtrot, Gypsy Tap, many of us would not know what these dance moves were. These were then removed when the decision was made to replace the hall to this new location. Many local farmers and town people, trucks, farm and shire machinery were used to cart sand and prepare the site for the building construction which was officially opened on 30 January 1987 with a cabaret held in the evening to celebrate. Now most likely this work would be completed by contractors.

I spent 5 years working in Perth before getting married and returning to Wandering. After having my 2 boys I was involved with the Wandering Playgroup and in 1999, over morning tea at playgroup Kylie Brand and myself suggested that Wandering should recognise the turn of the century and the potential impact that the Y2K bug where the computer systems inability to distinguish dates correctly had the potential to bring down worldwide infrastructure for computer reliant industries (boy did they get that wrong). We reached out to numerous community groups to form a committee to arrange a Millenium Ball. I had heard about New Year's Eve cabarets held by the Wandering Cricket Club but never old enough to go so this was an ideal opportunity to come together as a community. Funds leftover from this event were then distributed amongst the organising committee groups.

The Lions Club whenever they see the need whether it is beautifying our shire, cooking our breakfast or hamburgers at the evening community events show their care for our community. Our shire councillors volunteer their time and knowledge to represent us in many ways to improve our area and lifestyle. For many years, councillors would adjourn to the Wandering Tavern for a couple of drinks and unofficially gave the community opportunity field questions and feedback.

Whenever there is that sight or smell of smoke our local volunteer firefighters come armed to assist and it is amazing at how far they travel at any time of the day or night. Previously the CWA ladies as well as other community members would be in the background preparing and delivering food for our hardworking volunteer firies, it is a shame that this is now not encouraged as people just want help in whatever way they can. We are lucky to have such committed volunteers in our community.

When our boys were old enough to play football, I became involved in local Boddington junior football as treasurer and fundraiser and as well the Upper Great Southern Junior Football Association for a bit over 10 years. This was a rewarding time watching them and other young boys grow in confidence and see how the community and business supports junior sport financially and emotionally. Family and community members were there to train the team, drive the bus or offer lifts to those that didn't have transport, wash football jumpers and work in the kitchen to provide meals for the players and spectators.

The Wandering Primary School P&C was on hand at every State & Federal Election holding a cake stall, sausage sizzle or raffle to raise funds for the students. You could not get away without opening your wallet to release a few dollars.

I went back to fulltime work in 2002 and have continued where possible to volunteer with community groups. This would not have been possible without support from our parents.

David and I have been fortunate to travel within WA and then to Victora, South Australia and Tasmania where we have seen and experienced some awesome places and have wondered to ourselves what it would be like to live somewhere else but when we drive around the farm and then see our 2 awesome sons, 2 beautiful daughter in laws and 2 gorgeous little granddaughters there is nothing like home and Wandering.

Throughout my life the community support for each other, looking out for each other and our children makes small communities an awesome place live and raise a family. The proverb 'It takes a village to raise a child" resonates in regards to Wandering.

In closing, I believe small towns like Wandering area beautiful place to live and raise a family and encourage anybody to volunteer or get involved with local groups and clubs to contribute in making our community a great place to live.



Wandering Lions Club Sustainable Community Award

This person was linked into the Wandering community in 2011, when his daughter and son in-law moved their young family to town. They would visit regularly when on break from their working in the north of the state. During 2013 they became more connected to the community while they assisted for caring for their grandchildren while their daughter and newborn granddaughter were in hospital for 6 months.

He quickly established new connections with the people in Wandering. I n2015 commenced working for the Shire in a position that was seemingly made for him. Gardener/handyman and later that year they purchased property at Blackboy Springs. From then to now, he has been a very active member in the community,

He gave an Australia Day address in 2022 and is actively involved in the setting up of the event.

A lover of art and music - he is an active member of the Williams Repertory Club.

Designed and assisted with the building of the disability ramp at the community centre. Always keen supporter of future development to enhance our wonderful community.

One would often find him assisting, chatting to those visiting the caravan park. A great advocate for our town.

Regional fiction writer Fleur McDonald currently lives in Esperance, on the far south coast of Western Australia with her energetic Kelpie, Jack. As well as writing two books a year, Fleur still owns a farm and works on the land.

Her debut novel Red Dust made her the highest selling debut author of 2009. Since then, she's gone on to write 16 novels and two children's books. She writes about what she knows, stories set in regional areas around Australia with salt-of-the-earth characters.

In her personal life, Fleur put a lot of the money from her book sales into something else close to her heart – a charity to help people in regional areas who are experiencing domestic and family violence. Fleur drew on her own experiences to establish DVassist (formerly Breaking the Silence), a not-for profit which has set up an online directory of domestic violence services in regional areas of WA, and has recently launched a phone counselling service.

Fleur is an authentic, down to earth and engaging speaker, who can talk about rural fiction, writing, autism, domestic violence, overcoming hurdles and country life.



Mary Nenke is a woman of many firsts. She is an aquaculture pioneer, founder and driving force behind Cambinata Yabbies where she's intrinsically involved in all aspects of the Yabby Industry in Western Australia, from production to post harvest handling to marketing and exporting. She's also a mother of six adult children and grandmother of seventeen. She was an accredited teacher of Billings Natural Family Planning for over twenty years and taught sex education until 2018.

Cambinata Yabbies started off as a small family concern but evolved into a sophisticated and integrated business, marketing yabbies purchased from large groups of growers across the WA wheatbelt and Great Southern. It has also expanded into an agri and eco-tourism business after securing a grant in 2014 to build an ecofriendly village on their farm.

Over the years the Nenke's created a unique Wheatbelt experience transforming their shearing shed into a function centre with polished boards candle lit by chandeliers where they hosted the 'Cambinata Extravaganza' for fifteen years. This annual evening of fine food and wine promoted all that is wonderful about regional fare, attracting visitors Australia wide, and even internationally and led to Mary recognising the need for modern quality accommodation in the region.



How to be SunSmart

Australia is the skin cancer capital of the world. Two in three Australians will develop skin cancer in their lifetime, and every year around 2,000 people die from this disease. The good news is that skin cancer is largely preventable by minimising exposure to ultraviolet (UV) radiation from the sun. Being SunSmart is a simple and effective way to reduce your risk of developing skin cancer.



There's more to sun protection than sunscreen. Protect yourself in five ways:

Slip on sun protective clothing

Slop on SPF 30 (or higher) sunscreen on a broad-brimmed hat

Seek shade

Slide

on wrap-around sunglasses

Find Skin Cancer Early

Common skin cancer symptoms:

- A new spot or mole on your skin that is red, pale or pearly in colour
- A spot that is different from other spots on your skin
- Any crusty or non-healing sores



Aerial Geophysical Survey





Expanding our groundwater and ore knowledge

As part of Alcoa's ongoing commitment to continuous improvement, we are working to enhance our understanding of groundwater, rehabilitation and ore across targeted areas of our mineral lease using non-ground disturbance technology.

What is a geophysical survey?

Aerial geophysical surveys are non-ground disturbing surveys conducted using aerial technology (such as planes, helicopters, drones), that provide a spatially continuous, three-dimensional dataset which can be used to improve understanding of environmental, geological and hydrological features in the landscape.

About this survey

Aerial surveys are planned over areas associated with Huntly mine, including the proposed Myara North and Holyoake mine regions. Surveying will also include areas that we do not propose to mine to support a cumulative understanding of groundwater and environmental factors.

The surveys will involve one fixed wing aeroplane and one helicopter flying over our mineral lease from the south-east of Jarrahdale to the east of Dwellingup.

We have engaged globally recognised aerial survey contractors, Thompson Airborne and SkyTEM, to complete this important work. The aircraft will fly in accordance with Civil Aviation Safety Authority and International Airborne Geophysics Safety Association requirements.

There is potential for those living or working in, or visiting the survey area to see and hear the aircraft that will fly Monday to Friday, excluding public holidays, during February, March and April 2024. Flying will occur from 7am to 4pm.¹

¹The survey duration may change, depending on weather conditions.

Our aim is to support Newmont's priority and affiliated communities in a way that aligns with the company's principles of shared value.

Our priority and preferred assistance areas are:

- · Local economic development;
- Human capacity & capability development;
- Infrastructure and services;
- Natural Resource Management & protection; and
- · Culture and Heritage.

ELIGIBILITY

NBG will consider applications from the following:

- Local organisations, groups, or Authorities located within a 50 kilometre radius of NBG.
 This may include groups that deliver programs to communities within this radius;
- Organisations, groups, or Authorities that have recognised affiliations with NBG including membership of the Gnaala Karla Booja Native Title Claimant Group;
- Organisations, groups, or Authorities that deliver programs, activities or services that impact upon the greater south west region and its communities.

We do not support:

- Professional fees, conference expenses, travel and other expenses, unless specially authorized by NBG prior to application;
- Individuals;
- · Ongoing project costs, salaries or wages; and
- Planning documentation such as feasibility studies, cost benefit analyses, marketing plans and economic impact studies.

APPLICATION REQUIREMENTS

Applicants must complete a signed **Community Assistance Program Application Form** that includes all relevant detail and documentation to support the application. **NOTE:** Applicants are required to provide proof of incorporation and/or registration for GST purposes where applicable.

Community Assistance Program Applicant Guidelines



ASSESSMENT AND APPROVAL PROCESS

The application, assessment and approval process is designed to ensure accountability, transparency and impartiality. On receipt, all applications are reviewed for completeness and compliance with Newmont Policies and Standards.

Compliant applications are evaluated by the Social Responsibility (SR) team then recommends applications to the NBG Community Investment Committee which comprises three (3) NBG managers including the General Manager (GM) who makes the final decisions and provide approvals. All applicants are notified in writing of the outcome of their application within six weeks of close of funding round. The decision of NBG is final.

The applicant is responsible for ensuring that all information required to support the application is accurate. The provision of false or misleading information will result in the termination of any existing agreement and may impact future funding consideration.

ACKNOWLEDGEMENTS

Recipients of NBG Community Assistance Program grants are required to acknowledge the support received from Newmont. This may comprise, for example, inclusion of the Newmont logo on printed material or signage relevant to the funded project, or promotion in local media.

PAYMENT OF FUNDS, REPORTING AND ACQUITTAL

Successful CAP applicants will be advised in writing of the grant payment, reporting, and acquittal process at the time of notification of application outcome.

The following reporting guidelines apply:

- Sponsorships and donations up to the value of \$2500: provide a report detailing the program or activity outcomes including details of external recognition of NBG support.
- Sponsorships and donations over the value of \$2500: complete a NBG-CAP Grant
 Acquittal Form including a statement of income and expenditure or audited Financial
 Statement at the conclusion of the program, project, or activity demonstrating that grant
 monies have been expended in accordance with the application and agreement.
- An Evaluation Report may also be required demonstrating the effectiveness of the project against set outcomes.

Compliance with the appropriate reporting and acquittal for grants is a condition of future Community Assistance Program Grant Funding decisions.






Helping to Solve WA's Housing Crisis

A lot has been said about the housing shortage in WA. Not just in Perth or regional centres but throughout WA.

Businesses would like to employ more staff, but they can't find housing. A recent survey found one in five houses is the southern Wheatbelt is unoccupied. A lot of these vacant houses are on farms or rural properties.



Many are vacant for a reason. They are well on their way to rack and ruin. They are not needed for the farm, or they are too far out for anyone else.

But what about the rest? Still liveable with a modest investment. Not too far out, with access to power and water.

Farmers generally are not in the real estate business, but if you could rent it out to a good tenant with guarantees from the Shire or a local employer or both, and there is someone else to co-invest in any works needed, would you consider it?

The Shire of Wandering is investigating the possibility of a housing pilot using existing rural housing stock.

It is a lot quicker to refresh existing housing stock than to build new houses.

Do you have one and what would it take for you to make it available?

We need your input, your ideas, your suggestions - and your houses.

Every 24 hours feral cats in Australia kill about 3 million mammals, 1.7 million reptiles and 1 million birds. We are very lucky to have a number of iconic native animals in our patch including numbats, woylies and chuditch and these animal

are all at risk of being predated by feral cats.

Alcohol - Taking Time to Consider Our Drinking Behaviours

When a new year comes around it gives us a chance to focus on ourselves, our drinking habits and the importance of a healthy balanced lifestyle. Speaking with a group of blokes about this, I asked them to have a think about their attitudes towards drinking which one bloke replied, "I just love the taste". This is a fair enough response, and it's also the same problem I have with my kids, who love ice cream and chocolate, but trying to teach them that you don't have it every day takes effort.

The fact that going alcohol-free for a month is seen as a challenge for many, highlights just how prevalent alcohol use is in Australia. Alcohol is our most widely used and most accepted drug, and over time it has formed part of our Aussie culture and identity. Its use and associations are many, including advertising, sport, social occasions, celebrations and within the workplace culture. Peer pressure does not only happen to teenagers! Think of the last time you were encouraged to have a drink when you were not planning to. As Joe E. Lewis once quoted "I distrust camels, and anyone else who can go a week without a drink". There seems to be an underlying normalisation, glamorisation and justification for drinking which is also present in pop-culture, movies (The Hangover) and social media (my friend who posts it's beer o'clock').

Now I am not saying I'm a shining light leading by example when it comes to abstaining from having a drink, my arm is often twisted a bit too easily. We should all take the chance to have a think about our own individual drinking habits, behaviours and attitudes:

- · What example do I set when I drink?
- · How often/how much am I drinking?
- · Is it to relax?
- · Is it to cope or deal with stress?
- · Is it habitual or has it become a dependency?

For those who do enjoy a night out, here are a few points to help reduce unhealthy drinking behaviours:

- What mood/state of mind am I in before I drink? Alcohol is a depressant but can also enhance negative behaviours i.e. anger, aggression and reckless risk taking;
- What sort of situation/crowd am I drinking with? Personal safety is up to us! Am I with people I know and trust in a safe environment or am I out with random individuals in a public space?
- · Self-regulate by knowing your limits and plan ahead. Organise a designated driver, take a swag, don't risk it!
- Harm minimisation could involve having a decent meal before going out, serve finger food at parties and remember alcohol dehydrates so drink water before, during and after drinking alcohol:
- Having alcohol-free days is important. At least 2-3 days per week will show two benefits: 1, I can go without a drink and 2, has regenerative effects on the liver (along with many other health benefits).

I recently saw a creative post showing a picture of our political leaders with the caption *No matter who wins they will not fix your life, better plan on doing it yourself.* Like a lot of things in life, and especially alcohol, we can't expect governments and multimillion dollar ad campaigns to reduce the risk, control our use and fix alcohol related problems. Moderation, awareness, responsibility, and balance is the key to our alcohol use.


