Mary Nenke is a woman of many firsts. She is an aquaculture pioneer, founder and driving force behind Cambinata Yabbies where she's intrinsically involved in all aspects of the Yabby Industry in Western Australia, from production to post harvest handling to marketing and exporting. She's also a mother of six adult children and grandmother of seventeen. She was an accredited teacher of Billings Natural Family Planning for over twenty years and taught sex education until 2018.

Cambinata Yabbies started off as a small family concern but evolved into a sophisticated and integrated business, marketing yabbies purchased from large groups of growers across the WA wheatbelt and Great Southern. It has also expanded into an agri and eco-tourism business after securing a grant in 2014 to build an ecofriendly village on their farm.

Over the years the Nenke's created a unique Wheatbelt experience transforming their shearing shed into a function centre with polished boards candle lit by chandeliers where they hosted the 'Cambinata Extravaganza' for fifteen years. This annual evening of fine food and wine promoted all that is wonderful about regional fare, attracting visitors Australia wide, and even internationally and led to Mary recognising the need for modern quality accommodation in the region. 

Cash is king... or is it?

"Businesses have to accept legal tender." It's a comment we hear a lot at Consumer Protection, so I wanted to take the opportunity to clear this up and let you know what the law says about it.

Businesses can choose which payment types they accept. It is legal for a business to specify the terms and conditions that they will supply goods and services. This includes whether they will accept cash payment.

However, you must be made aware of these terms and conditions before you make a purchase. This could be a clear sign at the register or door stating the business does not accept cash, or the staff verbally informing you that you can't pay with cash.

We know a lot of people like to pay with cash to avoid credit card surcharges. The good news is there are rules about this too. Card surcharges are permitted under the Australian Consumer Law, however the fee must only reflect what it actually costs the business to process the payment, such as bank fees or terminal costs. If a business charges a payment surcharge, it must be able to prove the costs it is based on.

If there is no other way for you to pay without incurring a surcharge, then the business must include the fee in the total cost. For example, your local café charges \$5 for a coffee, but they do not accept cash, and all card payments are surcharged. Then it is not possible for you to buy that coffee at \$5. If the surcharge is 1% then the price displayed must clearly be \$5.05 so you can easily tell how much your coffee really costs.

While the costs associated with taking card payments is obvious, there are also costs for dealing in cash. Handling cash costs businesses in time and wages.

Remember, purchasing goods or services is entering into an agreement with a seller. You do not have to agree to make the purchase if the payment methods aren't acceptable to you. But, it is legal for the business to refuse to accept cash so long as they have made this clear.

PREMIER DUCKS QUESTIONS ON POWER & TELECOMMUNICATIONS 14th February 2024

Member for Central Wheatbelt Hon Mia Davies MLA has accused the Labor Government of continuing to pass the buck on failures to essential services in the Wheatbelt in the wake of the massive January storms that swept through the region.

In Parliament this week Ms Davies asked the Premier if the Minister for Emergency Services had briefed him on the unacceptable risk to lives and communities as a result of the telecommunications failures and lack of access to triple zero that occurred during the prolonged outage.

She also pressed the Premier on when more standalone power systems would be deployed to the Wheatbelt to prevent ongoing outages across the region.

"The Premier's response was wholly unsatisfactory, saying there would be yet another review and more conversation with telecommunications companies," Ms Davies said.

"He also made sweeping statements about the Government's program of delivering standalone systems across the State, ignoring the question of when more would be delivered to the Wheatbelt.

"There are communities that have been advocating for alternative power solutions in the electorate who have met brick wall after brick wall and it's simply not good enough."

The Premier refused to acknowledge if action to remedy the power and telecommunications issue had ground to a halt under the State and Federal Labor Governments.

"When asked to confirm that improving the resilience of regional telecommunications networks should be a priority but that nothing had changed under this state or federal Labor Government despite recommendations from multiple bushfire reviews, including the recent Corrigin-Wickepin bushfires, he avoided the question," Ms Davies said.

"His undertaking was merely to continue working with the Commonwealth to ensure that we have a much more resilient telecommunications system in the context of bushfire or power outage events."

Ms Davies said she would be holding the Premier to his word and asking for regular updates on progress to deploy improved power solutions for the region, along with greater resilience across the telecommunications network.

"People living in regional WA deserve a Government that cares about basic and essential infrastructure and services," she said.

"With a massive budget surplus it's not too much to expect reliable power, water and mobile communications."



Locals for Environmental Action & Protection (LEAP) Community meeting for Wandering – Saturday March 16th

South32 has been mining in the Boddington area for around 40 years, and in 2004, was granted a conditional approval for an additional 74,000ha referred to as the extended mining areas (shown as yellow in this map). This map shows the Northern aspects of the extended mining areas, as well as additional areas referred to as the east Quindanning mining envelope.



in the jarrah forest (state forest), and moving into these northern envelopes will require an additional 61km of transport corridors (conveyer) and 3 additional crushers. These transport corridors would need to cross the Albany highway, North Bannister Road, and the Brookton highway.

The central mining envelope includes a branch that runs east following North Bannister Road all the way to Missions Road, Wandering bringing the mine **8km from the centre of Wandering** and up to Luptons forest block, requiring a further 16km of transport corridors.

As South 32 continues to head north they will be sinking new bores in addition to the 14 bores they already have in use. This is required as they are applying to increase their water usage from 500 million litres of water a year to 900 million litres of water a year.

We will be holding a public meeting at Wandering Tavern on Saturday March 16th at 3.30pm.

We will be explaining the expansion approval process, your rights and a bit of what to expect as an affected landholder, as well as issues such as dust noise, water use, and the affect clearing such large expanses of forest may have on your beautiful area.

Have you registered your dog / cat? We get regular calls from people who have found dogs roaming. please register your pets so we can return them to you as soon as possible





Dog owners are required by law to have all dogs over the age of three months registered with Local Councils. Registrations are also valid throughout Western Australia so you can transfer your dog registration to another Council if you choose to move home or location.

In November 2013, the Cat Act 2011 took effect. The Act requires all cats that have reached six months of age to be microchipped, sterilised and registered with the relevant Local Government.






Helping to Solve WA's Housing Crisis

A lot has been said about the housing shortage in WA. Not just in Perth or regional centres but throughout WA.

Businesses would like to employ more staff, but they can't find housing. A recent survey found one in five houses is the southern Wheatbelt is unoccupied. A lot of these vacant houses are on farms or rural properties.



Many are vacant for a reason. They are well on their way to rack and ruin. They are not needed for the farm, or they are too far out for anyone else.

But what about the rest? Still liveable with a modest investment. Not too far out, with access to power and water.

Farmers generally are not in the real estate business, but if you could rent it out to a good tenant with guarantees from the Shire or a local employer or both, and there is someone else to co-invest in any works needed, would you consider it?

The Shire of Wandering is investigating the possibility of a housing pilot using existing rural housing stock. It is a lot quicker to refresh existing housing stock than to build new houses. Do you have one and what would it take for you to make it available?

We need your input, your ideas, your suggestions - and your houses.

National Speaking 4 the Planet 2024

Invitation to Participate

In partnership with the Australian Association for Environmental Education and Paddy Pallin, the Speaking 4 the Planet (S4P) team is offering Councils two ways to engage your youth in a sustainability education initiative. Councils may choose to support student participation in the national online competition, or you may choose to run a **live S4P event** in their LGAs.

S4P is an arts-based sustainability competition that encourages participants to think creatively and share ideas about living sustainably at local, regional and global levels. Here's a short video that says more about the competition: Advocates 4 the Earth - S4P - YouTube

The 2024 competition is free for participants in LGAs where councils support the initiative.

Topic: Trees, the Guardians of Life

From the blue beaches to its red centre, Australia is blessed with diverse and unique woodlands, rainforests and bushlands. With over 130 million hectares of forests, Australia has trees and canopies over about 17% of its land area.

Wherever we live in this country – near the coast, along rivers, in mountains or on plains – we have valuable trees and forests. From the northern tropical regions down through sub-tropical regions to temperate zones, we have trees everywhere. They are a part of our lives. And they matter. Trees sustain life. Trees sustain civilizations.

This year, the S4P competition asks participants to focus on the importance of their local forests – for themselves and their communities and their regions. This topic is linked to Sustainable Development Goal 15 – Life on Land.

Target audience

High-school-age youth (12-18) are invited to participate. And, for the first time, we are inviting teachers to participate in the writing category.

Categories

Competition categories for the 2024 S4P competition are:

- Speaking
- Writing
- Performance poetry
- Visual Arts

Closing date

The closing date is Friday 31 May. Winners will be announced on the S4P website on National Tree Day, Sunday 28 July 2024.



Support provided to Councils

A short document will be provided for councils, and an online session will be conducted on how to engage your schools. This will be scheduled in mid March 2024. Each participating council will receive a promotional poster with its logo on it.

Councils that run live events will be offered ongoing and tailored support. This will comprise zoom collaboration, preparation of special materials, local/regional contacts, and a checklist of tasks. Depending on location, support could include a face-to-face meeting.

Support provided to your schools

A support package will be prepared and distributed to registered councils for distribution to their high schools. The package will contain information on the topic, links to resources, and explanation and judging criteria for each category. Councils can also send their own local materials relevant to the chosen sub-heading.

Prizes

Paddy Pallin, a competition partner, will provide very practical items for first place in each category. In addition, first place winners will receive \$100 (in vouchers). Second place winners will simply receive a voucher. Councils are invited to provide prizes for any students in their LGAs and find opportunities for students to present/display their submissions after the competition finishes.

The best entries will be compiled into a digital magazine that will be sent to participating councils and to relevant government departments and Ministers and NGOs.

Cost

Councils are asked to contribute a \$750 fee for S4P to be offered in their LGA. This fee will allow all interested youth (12-18yrs old) and high school teachers in the LGA to participate in the competition. The costs of conducting and supporting a live event require individual negotiation.

How Councils can Participate

- 1. Register your Council to participate and make payment of the registration fee. Register by contacting Phil at phil@speaking4theplanet.org.au
- 2. Distribute the support package and poster to each high school in your LGA. A draft letter will be sent for you to adapt and send with the package. This letter will introduce the competition to your high schools and highlight the need to focus on local trees and bushlands.
- 3. Continue to promote the competition to your schools. If needed, a media release template can be provided. Council has the responsibility for communicating with its high schools.

Landcare matters

Hotham-Williams sub-catchment update



NRM is the management of natural resources such as land, water, soils, plants and animals. It brings together land use planning, water management, biodiversity conservation and sustainability of industries such as agriculture, mining, tourism, fisheries and forestry.

Rabbit control - What you can do

European rabbits have a huge impact on the natural environment and agricultural activities. It is estimated that rabbits cost Australian Agriculture \$216 million in production losses each year. Rabbits are one of the most widely distributed and abundant animals in Australia. They have a rapid rate of reproduction with a female rabbit becoming sexually mature at just 4 months of age and they can have 5 or more litters per year with up to 5 young in each litter.

To control rabbits on your property you first need to assess and understand the problem and to plan your control methods. There are a number of control methods to choose from including warren destruction, ground shooting, 1080 baiting, RHDV1-K5 rabbit virus release and trapping. Warren destruction can be quite effective as rabbits depend on warrens to shelter from the heat and to provide protection from predators. There is no silver bullet for rabbit control, control efforts need to be coordinated and ongoing with the greatest success achieved when neighbouring property owners are involved. The Pestsmart website has some great resources on rabbits and their control including the comprehensive Glovebox Guide which is available on their website or you can pop into PHCC's Boddington Office for your free copy.

When expectation vs reality doesn't match on Valentine's Day

Sending your loved one wilted flowers on Valentine's Day probably won't get you the reaction you were hoping for. Before you get a bunch of dead roses thrown in your face, Consumer Protection hopes there's time to explain you have rights under Australian Consumer Law (ACL).

Consumer guarantees kick in on products purchased through Australian-based stores, including online.

When a V-Day gift arrives but isn't what was advertised, such as flowers that are significantly different to the photo, or are wilted, you have a right to a remedy under the ACL, such as a refund, replacement or repair.

You also have rights if your special someone receives their gift late and you were guaranteed a V-Day delivery.

In the first instance, contact the retailer and see what they can do for you. Remember – you do not have to accept a credit note as a remedy.

Guarantees also apply on products purchased through overseas traders, however it is much harder to enforce, so keep this in mind when doing your shopping.

West Aussies should continue to be vigilant to scammers when shopping online. In 2023, online shopping scams claimed 305 WA victims, who lost a combined \$631,315.

To avoid being scammed, look out for social media businesses that display few or no contact details, as well as poorly edited ads with bad English. Also, don't pay for gifts through direct bank transfer, only use PayPal or credit card so you can dispute or request a reversal of charges if your gifts don't arrive.

If you're looking online for a special someone, you should be on high alert for romance scammers as Valentine's Day approaches.

Once a romance scammer has established trust, they will share elaborate stories and ask for money they say is to cover costs with illness, injury, business expenses, duty or customs fees, legal costs, family crises, or travel. Consumer Protection advises you to never share your bank account or credit card details with, or transfer money to, someone you haven't met in person.

You Are What You Think!

We have all heard the saying 'you are what you eat', implying that food fuels our body and the various types, quality, and quantity of food can impact our body, how we feel and therefore how we perform.

When we talk about our mental health and wellbeing, we refer to it as encompassing all aspects of our emotional, psychological and social wellbeing, so basically our mental health impacts how we think, act and feel.




Just like we have a level of control or choice over the types of food/fuel we put into our bodies there is also the capacity for us to influence our thoughts and behaviors which in turn impacts how we feel about ourselves and the world we live in.

As humans, we can often be very reactive and are driven by our emotions. Of course, how we react is individual and influenced by numerous factors that have conditioned us over our life journey (nature vs nurture) such as genetics, social, cultural, family influences, childhood experiences, and individual personality and behavioral types. However, as humans we also have the propensity for holding onto the negative more often than we do the positive.

In working with blokes in regional, rural and remote WA, and from my own personal life experiences, I have seen the fallout of unhelpful and negative thoughts people develop, carry and manifest during times of situational distress and poor mental health. Cognitive Behavior Therapy (CBT) is one effective approach for managing and treating a range of mental and emotional health issues. While this article is not a comprehensive overview of CBT, I would like to home in on one of its aims which is to identify and challenge unhelpful thoughts. CBT is more than just being positive, as I recently observed with someone experiencing a range of debilitating physical health issues; it was this exact phrase that one day triggered a negative emotional outburst: "The next person who tells me to stay positive, I'll tell them to get stuffed!", they screamed.


Their experience was firstly needing validation as the obvious pain and distress experienced was warranted, but it was the unhelpful thinking and negative self-talk exacerbating feelings of despair, frustration and isolation that also needed to be addressed. Common lines such as: "I'll never get better", "I feel useless", "no one cares or understands how I feel" and "bad things always happen to me!" are examples of some of the documented unhelpful thinking patterns CBT aims to address, including:

• Overgeneralization: You see a single negative as a never-ending pattern of defeat. • Personalization: Seeing yourself as the cause of negative events, no fault of your own. • All or Nothing Thinking: You only see things in black and white; if your performance falls short of perfect, you see yourself as failing. • Disqualifying the Positive: You reject or don't see positives experiences. You insist they don't count to maintain a negative belief that is often contradicted by your experience. If some of this resonates, check out some endorsed self-help apps like Moodgym or HeadGear. Both use CBT concepts to create awareness and challenge negative thinking patterns. Always remember, before it gets too much Talk to a Mate[®]!! or talk it over.





Narrogin Hospital Rehab Service helping people to achieve their goals

After sustaining a fall and a fractured ankle Karen was transferred to the Narrogin Health Service Inpatient Subacute Service from a Perth tertiary hospital for ongoing rehab. *"This service allows patients to receive the care they need close to home without the extended stay in Metro sites"* reports Subacute Coordinator Stacy Forrest.

During her stay, Karen worked closely with the allied health team to ensure she meet all of her goals before discharging home stating the team *"Were professional and included me in all decisions relating to my ongoing treatment. They always kept me updated regarding my progress"*. One of her highlights during the stay was the daily Physiotherapy sessions *"as I never felt that I was being pushed too hard, but at the same time, I noticed how well my strength progressed at each session"* reports Karen.

On reflection of her time in the Subacute Service Karen reports "*I have no hesitation in recommending this* program to others. In fact, without it, I feel that I would have been very disadvantaged in my recovery" and "everything about my experience with the service was positive."

Operating since July 2020, the Narrogin Inpatient Subacute Service has been able to assist over 95 patients in a setting close to home. *"Having family and friends able to visit can really help to improve mood and engagement in therapy. Being closer to support networks and familiar surroundings often leads to greater functional outcomes" says Stacy.*

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
