Give Credit Where Credit Is Due – What Are Our Expectations?

The world operates on the back of the people who show up! This saying is so true, and we see it in action throughout so many of the amazing communities we visit in regional, rural and remote Western Australia. Our small but durable communities are filled with individuals that have a huge capacity to endure the multiple challenges of working and living in the bush. That's why it's especially important to recognize our community champions who go above and beyond to keep things ticking over so everyone can enjoy a bit of work/life balance in their patch. We all do things daily without expecting a pat on the back, but it's not hard to show a little appreciation to those who spread themselves too thin.

A field known as *Positive Psychology* (focusing on one's strengths) has come up with findings that this aids in increasing wisdom, satisfaction and a sense of purpose. It's common sense really: how good do we feel when someone tells us we have done a good job?

There are three main areas where we can have a direct influence and use some positive psychology: in our family lives, in and around our working lives and in our community groups (sporting clubs, rotary/men's sheds, church groups).

UNDERSTANDING EXPECTATIONS

WHAT !!--EVERY TUESDAY?

The interesting thing is that it's almost a social and personal expectation to continually commit ourselves to our family, working, and community lives, and rightly so. These are all important areas and putting time and effort in gives us satisfaction.

Getting the balance right, however, between these three commitments is tough, especially when expectations are not understood. In the work we do we come across a lot of misunderstanding and distress caused by individuals not communicating what their expectations are. For example, a husband and wife discussing personal versus relationship expectations, a parent and teenager discussing boundaries, a boss and staff member discussing working conditions/priorities, and/or a footy coach discussing positions/roles within his team.

Some simple tips:

- Challenge negative thoughts and behaviours; is this helpful to me and my situation or only going to make it worse?
- I can't control what happens around me, but I can choose how I respond to things.
- Focus on and encourage the positive things in ourselves and others. Studies have shown that gratitude is linked to positive emotions, satisfaction and overall wellbeing.
- Provide feedback in private. Best and fairest, employee of the month and the school certificate presented in front of all our peers is fine, but to give someone individual feedback and let them know they're doing a great job will have a longer lasting impact.
- People can't hear what we don't say. Express our feelings and expectations and be willing to not only discuss these but we may need to be open to negotiation.

Having high expectations can be positive. They can help us grow as individuals and/or as a collective, reach achievements and hit our targets. However, many of us can also take this too far. We can easily become cynical about ourselves and others, especially when it comes to making mistakes. Shaming and blaming doesn't help! Look for the strengths in others and yourself and don't forget to give credit where credit is due.





Water supply in a bushfire

This information could save your life



While leaving high-risk bushfires is the safest option, if you plan to stay and defend your home, you must have an INDEPENDENT water supply and pumping capability. This typically requires water tanks of at least 20,000 litres, pump and generator.

This is required as mains water supply and pressure cannot be guaranteed during a bushfire due to the risk of power cuts, fire damage and extreme demand.

Use the Department of Fire and Emergency Services resources to develop your personal bushfire plan: mybushfireplan.wa.gov.au You can also download the My Bushfire Plan app via the App Store or Google Play to access your bushfire plan anytime - even without an internet connection.

To support bushfire plans, if you have groundwater bore access to surface water, you can take and store emergency water without it counting against your annual entitlement. For more information on this, and for the location of emergency bushfire water supplies in dryland agricultural areas, visit the Department of Water and Environmental Regulation website.

Drinking water

We recommend you keep a supply of drinking water on hand throughout summer in case your water supply is interrupted.

Assistance for customers affected by bushfire

After a bushfire, we can assist you with issues such as damaged water meters and payment difficulties. If you have been affected by bushfire please call us on **13 13 85**.



WA eID Tag Incentive Payment extended to 2025

The Western Australian Tag Incentive Payment (TIP) discount will be extended to include 2025 white electronic identification (eID) tags to support the State's sheep and goat producers transition to the new national traceability system.

The first step in the phased introduction of the mandatory system in WA will commence on 1 January 2025, moving to full operation by 1 July 2026.

The system is being introduced to enable traceability and enhance a rapid response to an emergency animal disease or food safety incident, as well as underpin valuable trade relationships and export markets.

Since the TIP scheme inception in April 2023, more than 4 million eID tags have been sold under the WA program, administered by the Department of Primary Industries and Regional Development (DPIRD).

The 75 cent discount per eID tag will remain unchanged for all National Livestock Identification System (NLIS) accredited white eID tags from 1 January 2025 to 31 December 2025.

Each eID tag contains a microchip that is read via a scanning wand or panel reader, which is uploaded to the NLIS database to record an individual animal's movements between Property Identification Codes.

DPIRD Chief Veterinary Officer Michelle Rodan commended producers on their uptake of the new eID tags, which she said would aid a smooth transition to the new mandatory system.

"The early adoption has enabled industry to start using the eID technology and test the complete system before it becomes mandatory," Dr Rodan said.

"I congratulate WA producers who have been proactive in adopting the eID tags and moving to better protect their businesses and the broader industry from the impact of an emergency animal disease."

Under the staged implementation of the scheme in WA, sheep and goats born from 1 January 2025 onward will be required to be fitted with a year-of-birth eID tag.

Those born before 1 January 2025 will require an eID tag when departing any property or facility from 1 July 2026.

Visual tags for stock born prior to 1 January 2025 can still be used for movement purposes until 1 July 2026.

Saleyards and abattoirs will be required to scan any eID tagged sheep and goats from 1 July 2025.

The WA eID system will come into full operation by 1 July 2026, when all sheep and goats will be required to be eID tagged before leaving the property and scanned at the point of arrival.

As we near the end of 2024, we thought it would be a good time to reflect on what we have all achieved for the positive health and future of our community and our local environment. With the increasing support of local communities, below is a list of just some of the events, articles and actions taken this year....



- 1. Commissioned silos to be painted at Quindanning by Sobrane Simcocky
- 2. Held informative meetings with Quindanning community regarding changes to environmental assessment system and government possibly closing the Office of the Appeals convenor
- 3. Attending rally at parliament house to save our EPA
- 4. Community meetings with Wandering and Williams communities to ensure they were well informed of expansion area and issues associated with this
- 5. Put together submissions to DWER regarding concerns of South32 applying for works approval to construct 2 mobile crushers and oily water separator very close to Hotham River
- 6. Galvanising community support and contributing to submissions to Boddington council against permanent road closures by South32
- 7. Held community meetings with Quindanning & Wandering regarding information on our rights to appeal the recommendation by EPA to approve South32's mining expansion
- 8. Submitting a huge, very extensive appeal document!
- 9. Helping many in the community put together their appeals documents (over 130 appeals submitted!!)
- 10. Media articles regarding community concern over ever-growing footprint of South32
- 11. Joining End Forest Mining Alliance
- 12. Starting petition to be tabled in parliament ensuring all surveys (water, biodiversity, Aboriginal Heritage) are done at the highest level before any ground disturbance occurs
- 13. Bus tours with The Wilderness society and WA Conservation Council to show them the impacts of South32 on our community
- 14. Public rally at Quindanning teaming up with First Nations and all locals to voice concerns, celebrate our achievements and keep raising awareness of the issues of mining our precious jarrah forests
- 15. Many, many emails and phone calls to agencies such as DWER, EPA and South32 themselves trying to hold all to account that our environment is actually being considered
- 16. Input to South32's shareholder meeting
- 17. Working with The Wilderness Society on broader campaign to stop the destruction of our forests and to protect the values of the Hotham River



While we wait with bated breath the decision the Environment Minister makes after the appeals process is finished, it is MORE IMPORTANT THAN EVER to make sure your views are heard!! Please take 5 minutes to email Minister Whitby (Minister.Whitby@dpc.wa.gov.au) or ring him (61 8 6552 6300) and let him know if you have concerns about the impacts an ever expanding footprint of South32 will have on water, black cockatoos and other fauna, flora, public health issues or climate change. Everyone deserves a say on our future, not just industry and mining lobbyists.




Wandering Lions At Work

Landcare matters

Hotham-Williams sub-catchment update





NRM is the management of natural resources such as land, water, soils, plants and animals. It brings together land use planning, water management, biodiversity conservation and sustainability of industries such as agriculture, mining, tourism, fisheries and forestry.



Secret River

Signs of Rakali, or Australian Water Rat (Hydromys chrysogaster) have been found in the upper catchment on the Hotham River

This intriguing semi-aquatic species is typically secretive and reclusive, so they are rarely seen except by chance. Their natural habitat is in burrows along waterways where there is lots of low-lying fringing vegetation, logs and branches to hide and feed in.

Clear prints of at least one adult Rakali were found on the Hotham River near Wandering. Trail cameras were installed in various locations over several weeks, resulting in a partial image which has also been confirmed as Rakali. This is one of very few inland and wheatbelt records over the past decade, due to reduced fringing vegetation on streams and rivers, reduced surface water flows and declining water quality such as salinity (which impacts on food sources as well as habitat for Rakali).

Unfortunately, a few feral cats have also been captured on camera (and footprints identified), and predation on our local fauna contributes significantly to declining numbers, which highlights the importance of projects such as 'Defending Dryandra' featured in the last issue of Landcare



The most important conservation action for Rakali is restoration and rehabilitation of the river environment, which is the primary aim of the River Action Plan activities being carried out by PHCC at eight priority sites on the Hotham and Williams Rivers. We hope to closely emulate the ideal Rakali habitat, by using woody debris on the banks of the rivers (check out the photos for examples), as well as ongoing planting of fringing vegetation.

National Agriculture Day recognises our important farmers, landholders, their families and support teams who continue to provide fresh, sustainable food and resources to our communities as well as their incredible work protecting a wide array of natural assets. World Soil Day was established by the United Nations, to raise awareness of the importance and relationship between soil and water in achieving sustainable and resilient agrifood systems.



Better Business in the Wheatbelt

with Ben Cole, The Free & Practical Business Advisor

I meet with small business owners across the Wheatbelt. I believe that an important issues that deserves attention from small business owners across the Wheatbelt is taking care of yourself.

I've founded two businesses over the last two decades – the last one started in Fortune Street in Narrogin. Over those 20 years, I crossed the line a few times in prioritizing the success of my business over my own physical and mental health. I regret cross that line and I'm keen to share a few ideas with you to help you look after yourself (and your business). Some of these techniques are well-known but I've put them into a perspective for businesses operating in the Wheatbelt.

Exercise: There is nothing more energizing or rejuvenating than exercise. Whatever exercise you choose, make sure you enjoy it. For me, I love a morning walk with my dog along the local river (with the water disappearing fast in the summer months).

Talk it out: As a business owner it can be lonely at the top (particularly if you are the only person in the business). I believe that speaking about a challenge can help – solutions don't always come quickly - but sharing your challenge with an independent person is a great step forward. It could be with a business advisor or a friend (ideally not in your local town so that you don't fall into the trap of holding back too much).

Keep perspective: This is the toughest one, but it is a great tool, keep a good grip on what really matters to you. For me it is family, health and friends. Business now comes in later down on my priority list. I always try to now hold myself to that priority list.

Podcasts: There are some great podcasts that explore the drama, fun and stress of running a small business. I listen to a lot of them and we all have plenty of driving time in the Wheatbelt.

My current favourite podcast is The Australian Business Podcast produced by Rask – it's chock full of practical tips on marketing, financing and does some great interviews with small business owners -






